The emphasis is on writing based primarily on critical reading and interpretation/analysis. Students plan, draft, revise, and edit compositions of increasing sophistication and complexity, progressing from multi-paragraph 750-word essays to essays of 1000 words that reference classroom texts as well as personal experience in support of a clearly delineated thesis statement. Students practice using MLA citation and bibliographic conventions in their research. Advanced grammar skills and mechanics are emphasized throughout each lesson.

Vocational Education (VOC ED)**319CE Pathway Ready (0.0) 1 lecture/0 lab**

This noncredit course prepares students to successfully transition into college by building the foundational skills, confidence, and awareness needed for academic success and career preparation. Students explore the college community while developing essential habits for college, workplace, and lifelong learning. The course provides an introduction to the industries, programs of study, faculty, academic expectations, and comprehensive support services within the student's selected Career and Academic Pathway (CAP). Through guided activities and engagement with college resources, students will clarify goals, understand pathway requirements, and develop a clear plan for continued progress at ELAC.

473CE Home Health Aide Training Program (0.0) 4 lecture/3 lab 2:1

This course provides an introduction to the role of the Home Health Aide in long-term care, acute care, and home care settings. Students learn essential safety principles, infection control practices, and methods for providing high-quality physical, emotional, and social support to residents and patients. The program emphasizes hands-on skill development aligned with state training standards. Upon successful completion of the program, students are eligible to apply for Home Health Aide certification examination in the State of California.

523CE AI Essentials (0.0) 2 lecture/0 lab

This course equips students with essential AI literacy skills needed in educational and workplace settings. Students learn to effectively use AI tools for research, writing, and problem-solving while learning how to evaluate AI-generated content critically and apply ethical practices to maintain integrity in their work.

524CE AI for the Workplace (0.0) 1 lecture/0 lab

This course prepares students to effectively leverage AI in workplace environments. Students explore how AI transforms workplace tasks across industries and develop practical skills in using AI tools to enhance productivity, solve problems, and improve communication. Through hands-on practice with industry-relevant AI applications, students build a foundation of AI skills that can be applied across various career paths.

Skills Certificate Requirements (Local Policy, Updated, June 2024)

The following requirements must be fulfilled before skills certificates can be granted by East Los Angeles College:

1. Grade of “C” or higher or “P” in all courses required for skills certificate.
2. LACCD courses with the same subject, number and title shall be deemed equivalent for purposes of satisfying local skills certificate requirements.
