Winter 2021 Updates

Enrollment Update

Winter enrollment was great. However, we are seeing a huge drop in enrollment this Spring 2021. So far, we have had to cancel 18 classes and we have reassigned several adjunct faculty. We have also been unable to assign hourly assignments to full-time faculty. However, we have been able to allow for classes to run with 10 students due to other departments and colleagues who have been willing to increase capsizes in English 102/103 to 45 to help balance out efficiency targets campus-wide. These capsize increases are temporary and in no way intended to undermine our efforts to decrease them, but due to the state of emergency in which we find ourselves, this increase helps to keep lower enrolled classes open. For more details on how this works, please see **Dean Jimmy Kenny** or **VP Ruben Arenas** who manage these decisions.

Outreach efforts

Special thanks to those of you who helped with phone banking and outreach efforts (via social media and word of mouth). Our Outreach Department led a massive PR campaign to promote all classes, and we put on our PR hats to assist them in their efforts. They have been working diligently to ensure our classes are advertised and promoted. Low enrollment is a state-wide issue during this pandemic.

Fall 2021

We will be online in Fall 2021. This will present another enrollment challenge, so please be prepared. Let's brainstorm as a department on some strategies for encouraging students to return, even though we will be online. Taking action early is the key to helping students build the confidence and the stamina to continue. We got this!

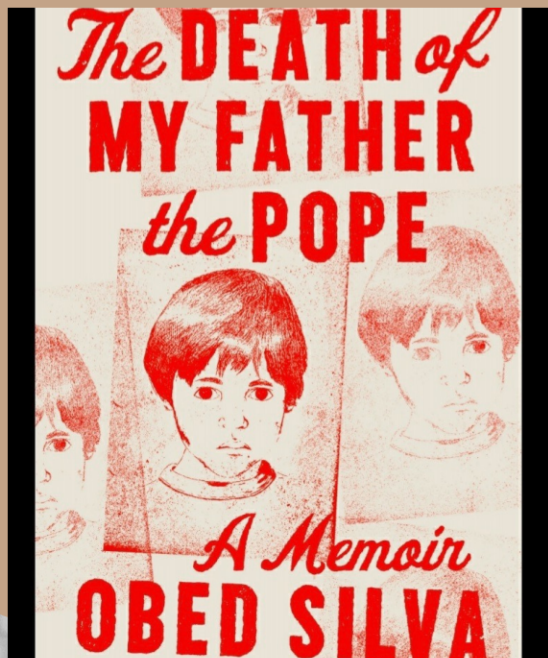

16 February Tuesday 12:15pm - 1:30pm	Using Technology in the Classroom: Transform Your Lectures Participants will be introduced to the features of Notability, a note-taking app, and Google Docs for the purpose of elevating their lecture presentations. Using Notability, workshop participants will explore how to present lecture topics and step-by-step problems more dynamically with animations and even how to incorporate student work samples. Participants also will learn how to use Google Docs to increase participation in their classroom, to answer multiple-choice problems, and to have students practice justifying their reasoning. Dweck in her book <i>Mindset: The New Psychology of Success</i> describes growth mindset, the idea that with help and effort we can grow our basic qualities such as aptitude, interest, and temperament. In this workshop, participants will discuss research conducted on the importance of growth mindset specifically in the STEM classroom and brainstorm ideas for implementing growth mindset in STEM classes. 25 February Thursday 12:15pm - 1:30pm	Harmony and Discord: Creating Class Community Through a Social Media Platform Whether from students or teachers, the lack of community or bonding is a common complaint about the transition to fully online instruction. But there are options. One that is gaining traction in scholastic circles is the social media platform Discord. This platform offers students a place to build a class community, largely for themselves, in a virtual space. This workshop's goal is to shed light on this emerging technology that will be used to create "the virtual quad" for individual classrooms. Participants will learn how to start their own account, populate a server for a class, organize that server into distinct channels, post vital class content, directly chat with students, and navigate the automated features of the platform.
